

At a Conservative Association meeting in Beckenham she told a packed audience: "It threatens the institution of marriage

riage? This is all about making sure children are looked after without putting it in the framework of marriage."

Chancellor Gordon Brown slashed £1 billion from the Married Couples Allowance in the budget announced two weeks ago.

He also introduced changes to family credit and the tax system, as part of a £5 billion scheme to help parents return to work

Many have welcomed the move to get people off bene-fits. But Mrs Lait thinks jobs

are being put before the fami-

At the meeting on Friday, March 20 she told members: "They're forcing people into a straight jacket—where, in essence, the only way people can get a reasonable income is to force them to go out to work. Many people believe children are best looked after with their mothers at home.

Not everyone agrees. Deborah Ellif, who runs a nanny agency used by dozens of working parents in Bromley and Beckenham, believes the budget has children's welfare at heart and increases choice

'I agree children thrive best in a loving and close family relationship, but I also think each family has the right to decide what is best for their unit — be that for one parent to remain with the child or for both to work and employ a professional carer.

"Whether parents are en-couraged back to emp, ment, choose to work, or hav to work, they need to be sured in their absence thei child is being properly cared

 Also daytime talks by Doctors on Meningitis symptoms & by the British Red Cross on First Aid.
- The agency produces regular newsletters and fact sheets to keep nannies, babysitters and clients informed of industry and agency developments.

Deborah added: "Any parent that has ever complained that their children have a better social life than them could benefit from a subscription to our babysitting service."
